




STRENGTH - Faith-based behaviour management program

Strength fledges do not need to be worn to school every day but may be kept for special occasions.

ENROLMENT IS A THREE STEP PROCESS

Students enrolling into Kindergarten must turn 5 by March 31, 2024. A Kindergarten information morning will be held on May 9, 2023 at 9.30am in the Narromine Christian School staff room. At this event attendees will be invited into the Kindergarten room for a literacy demonstration, our principal, Mrs Debbie Robertson will talk about all aspects of the school and answer any questions.

Stage 1: Submit the Application for Enrolment with your child's Birth Certificate and Immunisation record no later than Friday, June 30, 2023.

Stage 2: Narromine Christian School will contact you to arrange a school tour and interview with the Principal in early August.

Stage 3: If you are successful in gaining a position at Narromine Christian School you will be sent a Letter of Offer. This must be completed and returned to the school along with other forms and a \$100 Application Fee by August 11, 2023.

STARTING AND FINISHING TIME

School starts at 8:45am and finishes at 3pm each day. Teachers are on duty from 8:20am until 3:30pm.

SCHOOL READINESS

Deciding whether your child is socially, emotionally, physically and academically ready to start school is not as easy or clear cut as most of us would like.

At Narromine Christian School we believe that school readiness is primarily about emotional and social maturity rather than whether a child is able to count, read or write. Although possessing some competence with basic academic skills helps with a child's solid foundational learning.

When assessing a child's readiness for school ask the following questions:

Can they make an independent decision and follow through?

Do they have ideas of their own?

Can they follow two or three instructions at the one time?

Can they move onto new activities easily?

Do they separate well from their carer?

Do they show interest in and interact with other children?

Can they recognise and express their feelings and needs?

Can they concentrate on a task?

Do they ask and answer simple questions?

How do they deal with frustration?

All parents wish for their child to thrive and flourish in the school environment. To help your child settle more quickly into school it is helpful if they can:

Go to the toilet, eat and dress with minimal assistance.

Recognise their own belongings.

Co-operate simple tasks quickly.

Use a variety of items (pencils, pen, textas, paintbrushes etc) to draw, to scribble, to write.

Share and take turns with others.

Use scissors to cut along a straight line.

Identify things in a group that are different (day and night, up and down etc) and differentiate between opposites.

Recognise that numbers can be used to count.

HOW PARENTS CAN HELP WITH SCHOOL READINESS

There are a number of activities that parents can undertake with their children that will have positive effects on their development and encourage school readiness. Some of these activities include:

Reading with your child

Teaching them songs and nursery rhymes

Playing with letters and numbers

Creating regular opportunities for them to play with their friends and other children

Taking children on excursions (park, zoo, shopping centre etc)

ORIENTATION DAYS FOR STUDENTS STARTING IN 2024

To assist with your child's smooth transition into school we have three orientation days in Term 4 2023. Your child is welcome and encouraged to come to all three days so he or she may become familiar with the school, classroom and teachers.

The sessions run from 8:45am to 1pm in the Kindergarten classroom with Miss Harris and the Kindergarten students. The children will be encouraged to join in the classroom activities. They will have recess and may also stay for lunch at school (if staying for lunch, pick up time will be 1:30pm). Your child will be required to bring recess, lunch, water and a hat to school on these days. They will not be required to wear school uniform on these days.

SCHOOL UNIFORMS



UNIFORM GUIDELINES



A uniform dress code reinforces in students a pride in their own appearance, instils recognition of themselves as an integral part of the school community, and assists in developing pride in representing their school. Issues of equality, health and safety, and expense are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the *Dress Code*.

Narromine Christian School students are required to wear the full school uniform to and from school and during school hours. The uniform is to be worn with pride and respect and parents/carers are asked to encourage and foster this in students. It is compulsory to wear all elements of the school uniform as outlined in the uniform requirements and guidelines.

Parents/Guardians seeking exemptions or alterations to the *Dress Code* due to religious beliefs, ethnic or cultural background, student disability, health condition, or economic hardship must apply in writing to the principal who will make decisions on a case-by-case basis.

At time of enrolment a complete uniform set will be given to students (any extra items will need to be purchased) All uniform items except for school and sports shoes and socks are to be purchased from the school uniform shop, located in the school administration office.

Uniform Shop Opening Hours (School Days)

Monday and Friday - 8:30am-3:30pm

Orders can be placed on the School Stream App, once payment has been made, orders can be sent home with students.

UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS

- Jewellery is not permitted, except for plain watches and a single silver or gold stud in each ear lobe.
- Hair is to be kept clean, off the collar, and tied well back from the face. Extreme hair colours and/or hairstyles are not permitted on any student. Only maroon, navy, or hair-colour-matching hair accessories are to be worn in accordance with the winter/summer uniforms.
- 3. Uniform socks must be folded down socks that cover the ankle. Sports socks must be visible above the opening of the shoe.
- Shoes must be polished & lace up (except for Kindergarten to Year 2, who are allowed velcro closing and Mary Jane style closing shoes).
- Swimwear worn during sport, swimming carnivals, and school excursions needs to be modest and girls must wear a one piece, K to 1 students may wear a rash top and bikini bottom so that use of bathroom facilities is manageable.
- Undergarments (tee-shirts, bras, and singlets worn under the uniform) must be white or beige, and not have emblems, slogans, etc., visible under or through the uniform.
- All uniforms need to fit appropriately and be worn in the manner for which they are designed. All items are to be kept in a state of good repair and cleanliness, so as to represent the standards of the school.

- Black structured leather school shoes with a low heel no runners or volleys. Students may wear lace-up or high fastening Velcro shoes. Girls may wear plain style Mary Jane or bucket style – no glitzy buckles or designs.

THE VERY FIRST DAY

Children may arrive at school between 8:20am and 8:45am. Some children find it very stressful waiting around for school to begin if they are left too early. Try to make your good-byes fairly brief and leave as soon as you see that your child has settled or the teacher is looking after them. Most children who get upset are fine as soon as you leave the school grounds.

BE PREPARED

If you can, have everything ready the night before. Your child will go off to school happily if everything goes smoothly rather than a last minute rush.

If you are picking your child up from school, be there a few minutes early so that your child is not concerned that they have been forgotten or left behind.

Do not be worried if your child is happy to go to school on the first day, but on the second and third day they do not want to go. Some decide that they don't want to learn anymore! This is a typical reaction for children who are just beginning school.

WHAT ABOUT RECESS AND LUNCH?

All children must bring at least one piece of fruit or vegetable which is eaten at recess before other food is eaten. Recess is at 11am each morning and snacks such as cheese, yoghurt and biscuits may be eaten at this time. Children must sit down and eat before going to play. Please ensure you pack healthy options in order to give your child enough energy until lunch time. We do not encourage children to bring chips, lollies and chocolate as snacks.

Lunch is at 1pm each day. Make sure your child's lunch is quick and easy to eat. A cold drink (preferably water) is important, drink bottles containing water are the only drink allowed in the classroom. If you send too much food it will be left or wasted. As much as is possible, the children are encouraged to eat everything in their lunch-boxes. The school has a refrigerator for school lunches, feel free to pack food that needs to be kept cool. Please label your child's lunch box and drinking container clearly. At first many children forget that they have to be responsible for their own belongings.

Your child will need to bring his/her lunch every day except Monday or Thursday if you choose to purchase a lunch from the canteen. All orders must be placed on the schools canteen app Qrk by 9:15am on the morning of canteen.

SCHOOL CANTEEN

Canteen is run on a Monday and Thursday each week and recess, lunch and snacks can be purchased via the school's canteen app Qkr.

The canteen has a summer (term 1 and 4) and winter (term 2 and 3) menu. The menu and price of each item will be displayed on the school app and you will only be able to order from the current menu.

ORDERS MUST BE PLACED BY 9.15AM ON CANTEEN DAYS. Late orders cannot be accepted so please ensure you order on time to avoid any disappointment.

Snacks including chips, iceblocks and drinks can be purchased with cash on the day of canteen.

SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

Newsletter

The school newsletter is issued every Monday and will be emailed to you. The newsletter will also be placed on the school app.

School Stream App

The school app is a vital part of the communication between the school and families. This app contains information about the school such as the school calendar, canteen menus, newsletters and uniform shop. It is also the primary form of communication for reminding parents about upcoming events.

All parents and caregivers are required to download the app, we recommend doing so before your child starts school to get familiar with the app.

If grandparents and other members of your family wish to access the school stream app please inform the school of their names so we can identify and approve them.

Attendence - If your child will be away from school please complete the attendance form on the School Stream app.

Travel changes - if your child's travel arrangements change from the normal arrangement please fill in the pickup changes on the School Stream app.

HOMEWORK

At Narromine Christian School we feel that homework is a very valuable resource in the development of our students. Kindergarten students will receive homework from the second week of school. In term 1 an important aspect of homework will be parents reading to their child. Library books will be sent home each week and we encourage nightly reading.

In term 2 to 4 reading to your child each night will continue. Students will also bring home an individual reader to read to their parent.

WHAT DO CHILDREN IN KINDY DO?

Sometimes when children are asked what they do at school, they will give the response, "We did nothing all day", or "We just played all day". This is a common reply. In class, while core learning time is structured and modelled in a carefully sequenced way, other learning time may involve play or multiple hands on experiences, which helps consolidate your child's learning in these areas.

Following are some of the things that will be taught in Kindergarten.

BIBLE (Encounter)

Children will be taken through stories from the Bible with an emphasis on learning Christian morals and values and about Jesus' life and love for us.

READING

To start the year students are immersed in and focus on developing well rounded phonological and phonemic awareness skills, they learn all the essential phonemes needed to develop their skills.

Kindergarten students follow the InitialLit program which is a very structured and sequenced program teaching students all their phonemes, tricky words, blending and segmenting skills needed to consolidate the core foundational literacy skills to build successful readers.

MATHS

Cognitive development in Mathematics includes using critical thinking skills, problem solving and understanding of mathematical concepts. Children will be taught using the PRIME maths program as a basis, with a huge focus on number sense. Some of the topics include:

Comparisons - bigger, smaller, more, less etc Recognising and comparing shapes, sizes and colours Number order Number - sense and awareness Simple addition and subtraction Clocks and coins

HANDWRITING

The students learn to write using NSW foundation script. If you are teaching your child to write his/her name please use a Capital letter for the first letter only,eg. Rebecca or David.

SPELLING

During term one students are immersed in learning the basic phonemes needed for reading, writing and spelling. Incidentally, student's start their spelling education by memorising single phonemes and their symbols. Within a few weeks these phonemes are put into two and three sound words that the students are able to blend, segment and spell. These spelling skills and practices are also incorporated into writing practice. Students also write and spell their tricky words.

WRITING

In kindergarten, students are introduced to writing in a number of ways throught the year. Students are required to write phonemes, tricky words, cvc words and basic sentences in the daily Initialit program. Students also participate in a structured writing program which moves students through a structured and sequential process of learning writing processes, verbalising thoughts and ideas and putting pen to paper to express themselves through continually improved sentence structure.

HISTORY & GEOGRAPHY

(HUMAN SOCIETY AND ITS ENVIRONMENT)

The curriculum takes into consideration our school's acknowledgment that we have a Christian responsibility to care for people and our environment.

SCIENCE

In Science, children will enjoy participating in simple experiments and science activities. Children will study several themes throughout the year.

PDH

(PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT AND HEALTH)

Students will be taught about good health and food choices, to live safely and about making good personal choices in life. Students also participate in growing and maintaining our school garden.

TECHNOLOGY

Students use the school chrome books each week. The children will be encouraged to become familiar with the keyboard and to play simple educational games that reinforce concepts taught in class. Students also type simple stories and use the chrome books for Mathletics each week. Each classroom has an IWB (Smart Board). The smart boards are used regularly across all subject areas to enhance student learning. Students have access to VR headsets, beebots and other technology equipment which are used in Digital Technology time.

VISUAL ARTS

Children will have a chance to explore different art and craft techniques. Children participate in singing, dance and simple percussion classes.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION (PE)

During Physical Education sessions students will develop basic movements skills, e.g. skipping, running and ball skills. P.E. is conducted 3 times a week outside the allocated weekly sport program.

A variety of sports are conducted in terms 2, 3 and 4 by qualified coaches thanks to the sporting schools program. Rugby Union, Hockey, Cricket and Basketball are some of the sports taught. We also run Swimming, Cross Country and Athletics carnivals. These carnivals are run to a standard that allow qualified students to compete in the Christian School Sports Association Carnivals (Far West Zone).

STUDENT ASSESSMENT & REPORTING

The best kind of reporting is face to face discussions between the teacher and the parent. Our school encourages this kind of reporting wherever possible. An initial Parent Teacher Interview is scheduled with parents at the end of term one to give parents a basic indication of their child's progress. Comprehensive reports are issued at the end of terms two and four. Parent teacher interviews are conducted at the end of terms one and two.



SPEECH PATHOLOGY AND OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

Speech and Language Screener

We are privileged to have a Speech Pathologist (Emily Roffe) and Occupational Therapist (Annabel Ferrari) working at our school each week. Our aim is to screen and where required complete further assessment on our Pre-Kindy to Year 2 students to identify, assess and provide at school programs to support students that have needs in these areas either individually or in small groups at no cost to parents.

BIRTHDAYS

Birthdays are very important to young children. You are welcome to send in cupcakes for your child's birthday.



PARENTS AND TEACHERS

Our school is an open and friendly place. Come and visit just to get to know your child's teacher. Parents are very welcome in the classroom. Find out from the teacher when is a suitable time to visit.

Parents are always needed to help with canteen, craft work, reading and excursions. The children love it when their parents visit the school. It makes them feel special and shows that you are interested in what they have been doing. Spend a couple of minutes looking at the things in the classroom that your child has made.

Find out if there is anything that can be done at home to help. Sometimes there is cutting out to be done or reading books to cover. It all helps your child and the teacher.

If you are having any problems at home with your child that relate to school, then contact your child's teacher.
